Local Complaint Resolution (LCR) Matters

Inquiries can be resolved in two ways – Local Complaint Resolution (LCR) and Full Inquiry. LCR is a process of resolving complaints and issues by reconciliation. This method is now encouraged for many issues that formerly were subject of full inquiry processes, for faster complaint handling and more efficient use of resources. The table below outlines both matters that were historically resolved using LCR (sub-heading 'professionalism'), as well as matters that historically would have been resolved with a full inquiry but are now resolved through LCR (sub-heading 'Additional Categories resolved by LCR'). The figures below are taken from the PC Inquiries table and are not additional to those figures.
