Boddington RRR	Boddington RRR (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle) Project is aimed at reducing litter and single use plastic a local events. The local group to acquire a trailer and rebuild it to house a commercial dishwasher to be used at community events. Boddington RRR supply cutlery and crockery, as part of their wash up crew to reduce litter and single plastic use.	\$ 5,000.00
Boyup Brook Community Resource Centre (BBCRC)	Refill, not Landfill The aim is to reduce litter made by single use plastic water bottles at local events, by providing a portable water refill station. The refill station will be available for hire to make local events free from single use plastic water bottles, therefore creating less litter. The BBCRC is passionate about providing ways for the community to fight the War on Waste by diverting weekly waste items from landfill. A hireable water station, will enable this work to continue, and it will also help to educate users on the damaging effects litter has on our environment.	\$ 3,750.00
Capel Horse and Pony Club	Eventers Keeping WA Beautiful – Reducing Litter from Single Use Plastic Bottles and Coffee Cups/Lids. This project is aimed at 1) Reducing litter by providing water in reusable water bottles and coffee in reusable cups and installing a water tank that can be refilled with potable water and 2) Educating about the effect that single use plastic water bottles have on our environment when they end up as litter and the eventing community to reduce litter and think about the single use plastic they are using and use reusable instead.	\$ 4,962.00
Care For Hedland Environmental Association Inc	Recruiting and retaining regular Adopt-A-Spot volunteers in Port Hedland (post Covid-19) Care For Hedland aims to restore numbers to their healthy pre-Covid Adopt-A-Spot participant levels by purchasing and displaying temporary signage banners at two important thoroughfares in Port and South Hedland. The banners will remind residents one week in advance about regular Adopt-A-Spot events.	\$ 813.00
City of Bunbury	No Butts Bunbury The ‘No Butts Bunbury’ campaign aims to reduce butt littering in targeted public areas and will offer free pocket ashtrays via businesses in target areas. Bunbury is vulnerable to the impact of littered butts - being surrounded by beaches, having a number of waterways and lakes plus the southern-most mangrove colony in Western Australia. The last Community Clean-Up (pre-Covid) collected 450 butts in one area. The campaign will be supported via social media, online and incorporation into waste/litter education programs.	\$ 1,500.00 with \$3500 in product

City of Cockburn	Fishing Litter Reduction Program - Clean Ocean Clean Catch This project hopes to achieve the objectives of the City's 'Coastal Litter Action Plan', to remove litter from the City's beaches, thereby protecting coastal ecosystems. Litter from recreational fishing was in the top 10 list of items collected in the Cockburn beach (Australian Marine Debris Database show that from 2013-2017, 62,878 items of litter with a total weight of 2.1 tonnes were collected from beaches from C.Y. O'Connor to Ammunitions Jetty at Woodman Point). To solve this problem, the City proposes to install new bins and an education campaign targeting the fishing community. Bins and multi-lingual signage will be installed at fishing hotspots along the City's coastline. The fishing community will also be surveyed to support future behaviour change programs.	\$ 5,000.00
City of Joondalup	Little Feet Festival – Little Litter Hub The aim of the project is to educate in a fun and interactive way about the adverse impacts litter has on the environment. The Little Feet Festival is held each year and attracts more than 6,000 attendees. In 2020 the event will host the Little Litter Hub to provide activities for families to learn about behaviour change to reduce litter and protect the environment and will include the following activities that will be themed on litter prevention and behaviour change: Reduce Litter Pledge activity, Craft activity, Sing and Dance activity.	\$ 3,817.00
Hopetoun CRC	Beach Clean Bags This project is the production of 200 bags made from dense shade cloth for the community to use for cleaning up beaches and will promote an alternative to using single-use plastic bin bags typically used at Beach clean Up Day. Educating the community that beach clean-up should be continual with their Beach Clean Bag. The shade cloth used will be dense enough to hold micro plastics but will allow sand to flow through.	\$ 851.00
Judumul Advisory Aboriginal Corporation	Our Country Our Life This project is to address historical littered and dumped items. An audit will evaluate those of indigenous value to the area and assist in assessing littered areas.	\$ 2,780.00
Katanning Land Care	Party Again and Again in Katanning This project will provide free community dinnerware loan sets, to encourage more people to choose low-waste and waste free events, by making it accessible, easy and affordable. There will be one set of 20 crockery sets and 4 sets of 10 places each of high quality colourful melamine crockery/cutlery for use at outdoor events. They will be stored at the Katanning Library. Promotion about the importance of litter and waste awareness will be undertaken.	\$ 2,144.00

<p>Newdegate Community Resource Centre Inc.</p>	<p>Refill, Re-use, Reduce Newdegate currently struggles with a single use plastics litter problem. Due to the taste of local scheme water all available water is sold in disposable plastic bottles. To solve the litter problem a campaign will bring awareness to the detrimental effect single use plastics have on our environment by educating key stakeholders. A portable water re-fill station will be purchased and lent out to community clubs and events to massively reduce the use of single use plastics.</p>	<p>\$ 3,420.00</p>
<p>Ocean Remedy</p>	<p>Magnifying Microplastic Pollution in WA In conjunction with AUSMAP (Australian Microplastic Assessment Project), a nationwide program that trains citizen scientists to collect valuable data on microplastics utilising a standardised methodology, the project will increase the knowledge and capacity of communities to ‘take charge’ of the plastic litter problem and magnify community awareness of these issues, whilst providing education about how to reduce littering in their local area. This project provides vital data on the issue of microplastic pollution that is comparable with locations nationally. The data will be open access using the AUSMAP Hotspot Interactive Map. A cigarette butt ballot box will be installed for people to dispose of their butts and displayed in an informative manner.</p>	<p>\$ 3,802.00</p>
<p>Peel United Soccer Club</p>	<p>A Container for Community Change This project will assist Peel United SC in containing recyclable drink containers and educate club members and facility users on littering and better recycling habits by becoming a “Container for Community Change”. The Club has signed up to Containers for Change WA.</p>	<p>\$ 2,132.00</p>
<p>Shire of Capel</p>	<p>Get your Act together The Shire has created a performing arts team of three mime artists, They will perform 5, 15 second video vignettes that show them doing the correct behaviour re. littering and feature five aspects of littering with innovative education methods to increase community awareness These videos will be available online. Five signs featuring each litter solution will be produced for event use. The catchphrase will be “Get your act together!!</p>	<p>\$ 5,000.00</p>
<p>Shire of East Pilbara</p>	<p>East Pilbara Bin Art Project The Shire is saying 'no' more to litter by educating the community and visitors on the importance of not littering through artwork made by primary school students from Newman, Marble Bar and Nullagine, to be placed on kerbside bins. The wider community will have more interest in a message depicted by local artwork and visitors to the area will be more conscious of their behaviour as the values of the locals are highlighted on colourful bins.</p>	<p>\$ 5,000.00</p>

Shire of Exmouth	<p>Keep Exmouth Clean - Leave only your footprints, and bin your rubbish.</p> <p>The Shire of Exmouth will undertake a community and visitor education campaign with informational signage placed along a 20 km length of the main road into and out of Exmouth – Murat Road – reminding people to not discard rubbish from cars and to secure their loads of equipment and/or waste in trailers and boats as they travel along this road. Additionally, the Shire will make available paper car litter bags at the town’s petrol stations to encourage people to keep their waste safe until they can correctly dispose of it. A community clean-up day will be held in June 2021.</p>	\$ 5,000.00
Shire of Shark Bay	<p>Eco Faeries Plastic Litter Waste Workshops</p> <p>Shark Bay is situated in a World Heritage Listed Area, working with the community to maintain a pristine environment is a priority. Plastic Litter Waste Workshops during National Recycling Week (November) hosted by Eco Faeries, will provide free educational community workshops promoting initiatives to reduce litter by recycling plastic and creating environmentally friendly households and businesses.</p>	\$ 1,500.00
SUP Tonic Australia	<p>Keep Our River Clean</p> <p>This Project is to provide canoes/paddles for clean-up participants in 'River Clean Up' events along the eastern river between Maylands and Caversham. SUP Tonic Australia has been running a small community clean ups and this will broaden the ability for community engagement and education.</p>	\$ 3,000.00
Wellstead Community Resource Centre	<p>Litter Prevention in Wellstead</p> <p>A litter reduction message for Wellstead, to encourage people to dispose of their rubbish correctly and pick up rubbish as they walk around town. The project is associated with the launch of a collection point for the container deposit scheme with a litter prevention message.</p>	\$ 200.00
