Meet in the Visitor Hub before going on either the cultural tour by Kurrah Mia or a tour of the buildings with the National Trust. Both tours will run between 4:15pm – 5:45pm.

CULTURAL TOUR BY KURRAH MIA 4:15PM – 5:45PM

Barmup is the Menang word for tall trees. It is a very special place as it sits across an ancient song/story and walking line that is still visible to this day. Barmup is on the walking line which spans from Karlyenup (place of fires) line at the Museum of the Great Southern via York Street, Yakkin Twoort (Dog Rock), Barmup to the top of Seymour Street, where it divides, one direction going to Tjurtgellong or Lake Sepping and the other line to Binalup (Middleton Beach). The top area of Barmup is a camp site, which is well away from the permanent source of water on the site. Participants of the walk will see Kaunt (shelter) native bush, medicine and food plants as well as see the differences in old buildings and in even older ones.

The tour is an easy walking one and will take approximately 1.5 hours. Please wear walking shoes and dress appropriately for the weather.

NATIONAL TRUST TOUR OF THE BUILDINGS 4:15PM - 5:15PM

SITE VISIT - STRAWBERRY HILL AT BARMUP

Strawberry Hill at Barmup, located in present-day Albany, is significant as an important camp site for the Menang people and the site of the first colonial farm to be established in Western Australia. There are structures on the site that date back to the very earliest days of European Settlement, including a rare example of a 'cob' farm workers' cottage built in the 1830s. The National Trust is undertaking major works at the site, which are scheduled to be complete in time for Strawberry at Barmup to play a central role in Bicentenary commemorations due to be held in Albany in 2026.

H+H Architects are the lead consultants for the works. Tom Stevens and Lawrence Cuthbert from H+H will lead a tour of this remarkable site, and discuss the challenges and opportunities involved with the proposed works. This will include an examination of the unique challenges involved with conserving cob buildings.

TOUR OF PILOT STATION WITH SOUTHERN PORTS

A tour through Western Australia's first and only known extant 19th Century Pilot Station, see the concept designs recently funded by the State Government to \$8.3M and soak in the outstanding vistas nestled high above Ataturk Channel.



YARNING COUNTRY WITH MERNINGAR BARDOK ELDER LYNETTE KNAPP AND UWA ALBANY'S PROFESSOR STEPHEN HOPPER

The yarn will convey a Noongar family's perspective on Albany and its cultural significance, as well as western science insights, as explored at length by Lynette and Steve in collaborative oral history sessions under the four-year Walking Together project. The yarn will occur on the north edge of the tourist precinct associated with the National Anzac Centre atop Mt Adelaide, in an undercover pavilion. After an hour or so of yarning and Q&A, we will drive in cars to the midslopes of Mt Melville to inspect a gnaama boorna (water tree) of great cultural significance to Noongars from the Albany region. It will take a short walk of 500m along roads and tracks to approach the tree.
