What is the office of the Public Advocate?



There are lots of government offices in Western Australia.



The **Office of the Public Advocate** is a government office.



This is what the logo looks like.



The **Office of the Public Advocate** is hard to say.

Sometimes people call it OPA instead.

You say it like this - 'Owe-per'

Who works at the Office of the Public Advocate?



The **Public Advocate** is a person.

She is in charge of people working at OPA.



A lot of people work for the **Public Advocate**.



Some of these people are called investigators.



Investigators help to work out whether a person needs a guardian or administrator.

Other people who work at OPA are called guardians.



A guardian makes decisions for someone who can't make their own decisions.

What type of decisions can a guardian make?



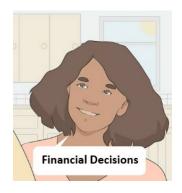
A guardian can make decisions about where you live, your medicine, health and services.



These are called **lifestyle decisions**.



A guardian cannot make decisions about money, selling things and paying bills.



Decisions about money, selling things and paying bills are called **financial decisions**.

An administrator makes these decisions.
