This strong participation reflects a growing interest in our heritage, highlighted recently by the remarkable turnout at the 2024 Regional Heritage Conference in Albany, where a record 110 attendees gathered in person, with an additional 50 unique viewers joining via livestream.

On a personal note, I would like to thank the Minister for Heritage, who has been a passionate advocate and supporter of Western Australia's heritage since his appointment in 2017. This will be his last Awards as Minister, and his presence at heritage events and his unwavering dedication to this cause will be missed.

I would also like to thank my fellow Councillors for their hard work and support, as well as the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage for facilitating the work of the Heritage Council.

Finally, congratulations to all nominees and Award recipients. Each of you has contributed to preserving and celebrating Western Australia's heritage, and we look forward to honouring your achievements tonight.
